Shiplake Deemed Excellent Across the Board @

Following a full ISI inspection in April 2015, Shiplake College has been judged as 'excellent' across every single inspection category, the highest possible grade of achievement. Commendation of this magnitude is rare in independent education, placing Shiplake amongst a select group of leading schools. Indeed, no other local competitor schools have received such high praise in recent inspections.



The school is highly successful in maintaining a friendly atmosphere, which enables pupils and staff to enjoy their busy working lives.

ISI Integrated Inspection - Spring 2015

The inspection team observed lessons, attended co-curricular activities, conducted formal interviews with staff and pupils and examined samples of work. The inspection report gave a clear judgement on each aspect of the school. These headline statements are based on a four point descriptor scale ranging from 'unsatisfactory' to 'excellent'. After collating and analysing evidence in each of the nine domains, the inspection team deemed Shiplake to be 'excellent' – the highest accolade – in every field.



The positive attitude of pupils towards learning was frequently referenced, alongside the individualised curricular and extra-curricular programmes in place, which 'allow all pupils to develop self-confidence, achieve a measure of personal success and be challenged inside and outside the classroom.' ISI noted that 'pupils display a cheerful confidence and ready courtesy to all members of the community, and flourish in the school's nurturing and supportive atmosphere.' Inspectors cited numerous opportunities which allowed pupils to 'develop their character, confidence and leadership skills.' The report also praised the pastoral care offered by staff throughout the College.

I am particularly proud that our teaching and learning, personal development of pupils, and ability to inspire creativity and innovation amongst young people are now applauded alongside the outstanding pastoral care and co-curricular provision for which we have always been known.'

New Management Structure

The Headmaster and Chairman of Governors are pleased to share details of a new management and leadership structure at Shiplake College, taking effect from September 2015. The changes followed the news that Deputy Headmaster Rob Jones has been appointed as Headmaster of HMC school Rendcomb College.

In response to Shiplake's recent growth and our increased proportion of day pupils, the Headmaster has taken the opportunity to revert from a vertical management structure to a more horizontal arrangement. This is in line with HMC guidance, and closely replicates structures which have worked effectively in other leading schools. The role of Deputy

Headmaster has now been split into two domains, covering academic and pastoral responsibilities. Ian Munro, formerly Director of Studies, has been appointed

Deputy Head Academic, while Nick Brown, formerly Assistant Head Co-Curricular, will become Deputy Head Pastoral.

Mr Munro will oversee all activities relating to teaching and learning, including the monitoring of standards and practice, reporting and assessment frameworks, and preparing pupils for examinations. Mr Munro will work alongside two new Academic Assistant Heads,





Paul Jones (Year 7-11) and Richard Curtis (Sixth Form), to monitor the curriculum across all key stages. Mr Brown will manage all aspects of pastoral care at Shiplake College. This includes child protection and safeguarding, pupil discipline, mentoring and tutoring. He will be supported by Senior Housemaster Andrew Dix, Assistant Head Co-Curricular Alex Hunt and Director of Sport James Gaunt.

An Inspirational Final Day @

On Wednesday 24 June, the Shiplake College community of pupils, staff, parents and governors gathered to celebrate the end of another academic year, and bid a fond farewell to departing Year 13 pupils. Amar went on to say that 'we are all shareholders in this beautiful experience called life, and we must invest our heart, our soul, our everything, into making the most of this gift.'



Author Visit Inspires Budding Novelists

Pupils in Year 7, 8 and 9 received a visit from London-based author Andy Mulligan, known for such works as Trash and Ribblestrop. Having spent a decade working as a theatre director, Andy gained experience teaching in India, Brazil, Vietnam and the Phillipines, before turning his attention to writing full time.

Ribblestrop, published in 2009, gained national acclaim, and was shortlisted for the Roald Dahl Funny



Books prize. Trash followed this successful foray into writing. The film rights to the book - about three dumpsite boys who make a lifechanging discovery - have also been snapped up.

The boys had been busy reading and studying Trash in class, and thoroughly enjoyed engaging with the author. Andy spent time explaining, using photographs, the story behind the novel. The group then split into small classes, and experienced a writing workshop with the author.

Andy had an attentive audience, as he told pupils how he had borrowed stories from friends and family, building on anecdotes to create episodes in the narrative of a tale. The pupils then tried their own hand at writing, constructing



novel openings and using dialogue to develop stories and characters. Andy offered the budding authors constructive direction.

Teacher Mrs Hallam was 'immensely impressed with the passion that was ignited throughout the day; we may well have awoken a budding novelist or two! We very much appreciated the time Andy spent with us.'


East Meets West

During the Spring Term, students had a unique cultural opportunity in lessons. Visiting from the north west provinces of China, four Chinese teachers came to the school to give Shiplake students a taste of lessons in the Far East. Working their way through numerous different subjects during their week-long stay, the teachers took classes ranging from Languages to Geography, observing lessons taught by Shiplake staff, as well as delivering classes themselves.

Organised as part of a Continuing Professional Development scheme funded by the Chinese government, and linked to Reading University, the Modern Languages Department coordinated a placement for the teaching quartet to visit the College.

Pupils enjoyed the challenging and interesting lessons, including an introduction to Mandarin, Mongolian culture, Chinese cookery and life in a Chinese school.







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Entrepreneur Visits

During the busy month of March, the Business Studies Department managed to welcome three speakers from very different backgrounds. The guest speakers were available to give students an insight into the world of business, entrepreneurship and charity work.

Entrepreneur and Youth Performance Coach James Davey offered pupils an insightful understanding of how the 'real world' of business operates. James started his own company, which focuses specifically on young people and the challenges they face in today's society. The Bursar Mr Walne then spoke to students from Year 12 about the school's finances, forming an invaluable introduction to the students studying financial affairs.

Finally, CEO and founder of AMECA, Ruthie Markus, opened up a world of possibilities about raising money for charities working in Africa. Horizons were expanded and students galvanised, and skills necessary in an increasingly competitive workspace were learnt.

The practical work, part of each year's coursework, counts for a significant portion of the overall mark achieved by students. The work ranged from film openings to music videos.

Head of Media Mr Marcus Milburn, dressed in a tux, had pulled out all the stops for the event, hosting



the inaugural event in the Lecture Theatre and screening each piece of coursework.

Prizes were awarded across a range of categories, including 'Best Editing', 'Best Production Design' and 'Best Cinematography'. Winners were announced from a list of nominees.



The big winners on the night were Cam Whitelaw, Zach Heppner-Logan, Louise French and Connor Cummings, winning 'Best Film' for their thriller Anonymous. Harry Chapples, Lucy Collings and Emily Holloway took home two awards, for their music video Glory and Gore, by Lorde.

A Productive Day in the Workshop

GCSE Design and Technology has undergone a restructure, meaning that coursework previously completed during Year 11 is now finished in Year 10. As such, each boy from Year 10 participated in a 'Manufacturing Day', dedicating time to complete the majority of the projects.

The day replicated a 'work' day; arriving in workshop appropriate attire, the boys came armed with a plan of manufacture, ready to get started. Using a wide variety

of techniques and materials, pupils set their mind to creating, using wood, plastic and some incorporating electronics. They will now have more time for exam preparation in Year 11.






For the first time since 1986, Shiplake's senior 1st VIII claimed gold in the Child Beale Cup, seeing off the likes of Latymer Upper, Bedford School and Reading Blue Coat in the final, which they led from



start to finish. Having come away with a silver medal last year, the boys were incredibly motivated to improve on last year's performance, and dominated the field from start to finish. Shiplake's J16 IV showed the future is extremely bright with astonishing performances in the premier 'championship' race category. The J16 IV of Seb Newman, Henry Blois-Brooke, Hugo Oglina and Christian Hjortland-Marks claimed silver medals in their final, finishing narrowly behind Eton College. The Year 11 quartet were joined by teammates in the Championship VIIIs event, missing out on a medal by just 0.23 of a second.



Fili's Toulon Deal



Year 12 rugby scholar Fili Savou will begin his professional career next season, after signing a 3 year contract with RC Toulon. Toulon are widely recognised as the leading force in European rugby, having won the Heineken Cup for the past three seasons. Powerful centre Fili has represented England and Fiji in youth internationals, and emerged as a key member of Saracens' academy squad. He now follows in the footsteps of British talents including Jonny Wilkinson, in making the trip across the channel.

Valiant Effort at Royal Regatta @



The Henley Royal Regatta provided further signs of a bright future for Shiplake rowing, as the 1st VIII tasted victory for the first time in five years. A stellar day one performance by the bees saw them overcome Bedford Modern School, before narrowly missing out on a spot in the Princess Elizabeth Challenge Cup quarter finals. An early start and scorching temperatures did nothing to dispel local pride, with a sea of iconic Shiplake blazers out in force to support the boys in their first race The senior crew of Waller, Green, Carey, Thomann, Cawthorne, H Berkley, T Berkley, Gerrard and cox Pond made a fast start and immediately built a healthy lead. This was extended gradually across the famous course, with Shiplake clocking an impressive time to beat their opponents by 4 lengths. In the next round, a tough draw pitched

Shiplake against Radley College,

touted as one of the favourites for the title. There was nothing to split the boats in the opening stages, but once Shiplake settled into their rhythm, Radley kept pushing to build a narrow lead. The bees continued to battle bravely but could do nothing to reign in the Oxfordshire powerhouses, eventually succumbing to defeat by two lengths. Meanwhile, Shiplake's J16s missed out on qualification for the Temple Challenge Cup, which features Britain's top

universities, by just 1.2 seconds. Director of Rowing Dave Currie commented: 'I am pleased by the progress made this year, and getting a win at Henley caps a successful season. I hope this year's 1st VIII will serve as role models to the younger rowers coming through, as there is no reason why we cannot start competing in the latter stages of Henley in the coming years.'






